***Re: Notice of Data Security Incident***

To Whom It May Concern:

We represent Monmouth University (“Monmouth”), 400 Cedar Avenue, West Long Branch, NJ 07764, in connection with an incident that may have involved the personal information of 217 New Hampshire residents. Monmouth is reporting the incident pursuant to N.H. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 359-C:20. This notice will be supplemented, if necessary, with any new significant facts discovered subsequent to this submission. While Monmouth is notifying you of this incident, Monmouth does not waive any rights or defenses relating to the incident.

**NATURE OF THE INCIDENT**

On March 3, 2026, Monmouth learned that an unauthorized third party gained unauthorized access to Monmouth’s network. Monmouth immediately took steps to further secure its systems and Monmouth began an investigation, with the assistance of a leading cybersecurity firm. Monmouth also reported the incident to law enforcement. The forensic investigation determined that the unauthorized third party acquired certain files from Monmouth’s network between February 5, 2026 and February 13, 2026. On May 29, 2026, Monmouth completed the review of the files and determined that they contained the personal information of 217 New Hampshire residents. The information varied by individual and included name, date of birth, Social Security number, driver’s license/state ID number, passport number, financial account number, payment card information, medical treatment/diagnosis information, health insurance information and/or username and password. Monmouth is not aware of any fraud or identity theft to any individual as a result of the incident.

## **NOTICE TO THE RESIDENTS**

Monmouth is notifying 217 New Hampshire residents of the incident via first-class United States mail starting on June 30, 2026. The notification letter describes the incident, provides information on protecting against potential fraud and identity theft, and includes an offer of complimentary credit monitoring services. Monmouth has also arranged for a dedicated call line to assist in responding to inquiries regarding the incident. Enclosed is a sample of the notification letter.

## **STEPS TAKEN RELATING TO THE INCIDENT**

Upon learning of the incident, Monmouth promptly took steps to further secure its systems and engaged a forensic security firm, through counsel, to assist with Monmouth's investigation of the incident. Monmouth is undertaking further efforts to reduce the risk of this type of incident from occurring in the future, including enhancing its technical security measures. Finally, as discussed above, Monmouth is notifying involved individuals, offering complimentary credit monitoring services, and providing information on how to protect against fraudulent activity and identity theft.

RE: NOTICE OF DATA BREACH

Monmouth University values and respects the privacy of your information, which is why we are writing to advise you of an incident that may have involved some of your personal information. We have no evidence that the information involved in this incident has been misused for the purpose of committing fraud or identity theft. Nonetheless, we want to make you aware of the incident and the steps we have taken to address it.

**What Happened?** On March 3, 2026, we learned that an unauthorized third party potentially accessed some of Monmouth's data. Upon discovering the incident, we promptly began an internal investigation, worked to secure our systems, and notified federal law enforcement. We also engaged a forensic security firm to assist with our investigation and ensure the security of our computer network. The forensic investigation determined that an unauthorized third party acquired certain files from our network starting on or about February 5, 2026.

**What Information Was Involved?** We reviewed the files acquired by the unauthorized third party to determine if they contained any personal information. Based on the results of our investigation, on May 29, 2026, we determined that the files could contain some of your personal information, including your name, date of birth, Social Security number, driver's license/state ID number, passport number, financial account number, payment card information, medical treatment/diagnosis information, health insurance information and/or username and password.

**What We Are Doing.** In addition to the actions described above, we are taking further steps to reduce the risk of this type of incident occurring in the future, including enhancing our technical security measures. Also, although we are not aware of any instances of fraud or identity theft involving your information, we are offering a complimentary one-year membership of Experian IdentityWorks<sup>SM</sup> Credit 3B. This product helps detect possible misuse of your personal information and provides you with identity protection services focused on prompt identification and resolution of identity theft. IdentityWorks Credit 3B is completely free to you, and enrolling in this program will not hurt your credit score. **For more information on identity theft prevention and IdentityWorks Credit 3B, including instructions on how to activate your complimentary membership, please see the additional information provided in this letter.**

**Fraud Alerts:** By law, you have the right to place a fraud alert on your credit report if you believe you have been, or are about to become, a victim of fraud or related crime. A fraud alert is free and will stay on your credit report for one (1) year. The alert informs creditors of possible fraudulent activity within your report and requests that the creditor contact you prior to establishing any new accounts in your name. To place a fraud alert on your credit report, contact any of the three national credit reporting agencies using the contact information listed above. **Credit and Security Freezes:** By law, you have the right to place a credit freeze, also known as a security freeze, on your credit file, so that no new credit can be opened in your name without the use of a PIN number that is issued to you when you initiate the freeze. A credit freeze is designed to prevent potential credit grantors from accessing your credit report without your consent. If you place a credit freeze, potential creditors and other third parties will not be able to get access to your credit report unless you temporarily lift the freeze. Therefore, using a credit freeze may delay your ability to obtain credit. Unlike a fraud alert, you must separately place a credit freeze on your credit file at each credit reporting company.
